

Whatley hosts documentary Friday about opera singer who overcame discrimination

"When I Rise," a new documentary film about East Texas native Barbara Smith Conrad, will be presented free of charge to the northeast Texas community Friday, June 18. The film screening will occur at 6:30 p.m. at the James and Elizabeth Whatley Center for Performing Arts at Northeast Texas Community College in Mount Pleasant.

"When I Rise" is the powerful story of Conrad, a gifted University of Texas music student who became a target of racial discrimination in the late 1950s and ultimately ascended to the heights of international opera.

Produced by the Dolph Briscoe Center for American History at The University of Texas at Austin, "When I Rise" is an Alpheus Media Production, in association with Allentown Productions.

The film was directed by award-winning Austin filmmaker Mat Hames. Producers include Academy Award-winner James Moll and award-winning filmmaker Michael Rosen.

Conrad, who now resides in New York, grew up in the Center Point community in Upshur County. She will attend the film screening.

Texas State Rep. Bryan Hughes of Mineola who represents Camp, Harrison, Upshur

and Wood Counties, will be present to greet Conrad and introduce the film.

"As her state Representative, I'm honored to help welcome Barbara back to her home state," said Hughes. "Her story is an important part of the history of human rights, and her faith and dignity throughout her ordeal are truly inspirational."

"When I Rise" is an official selection of the 2010 Dallas International Film Festival, the Hot Docs International Documentary Festival in Toronto, the South by Southwest Film Festival in Austin, and the New York City International Film Festival.

"We've only shown the film to a few audiences so far, and we're very pleased that the people of northeast Texas, where the story originated, will be among the first to view it," said Dr. Don Carleton, executive director of the Briscoe Center and executive producer of "When I Rise."

The film was made possible in part by AT&T. Ms. Conrad's appearance at the Whatley Center is made possible by support from Southwestern Electric Power Company. The Whatley Center theater is provided by Northeast Texas Community College.

Seating at the June 18 screening is free of charge and available on a first-come, first served-basis.



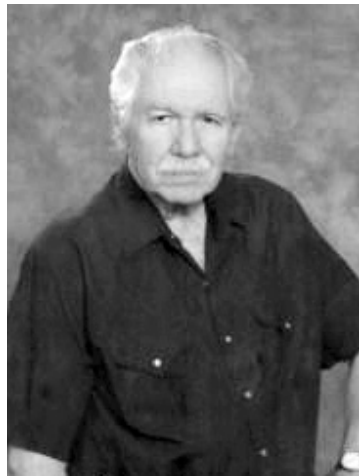
Barbara Conrad gave a concert in the rotunda of the Texas Capitol in conjunction with her being recognized by the state legislature in Feb. 2009.

Award-winning western writer to visit Winnsboro

WINNSBORO – East Texas author Jory Sherman will be at the Winnsboro Center for the Arts on Friday June 18th from 1-4 p.m. and Saturday, June 19, from 1-4 p.m. This is part of the 3rd Friday Arts Festival sponsored by the City and the Winnsboro Cultural Arts District.

Sherman will have his two latest books "Shadows of Yesteryear" and "Savage Hellfire" available for autographing. He will also have some of his paintings on display.

Despite being legally blind, Sherman has recently revived his interest in painting under the tutelage of Graham Hopkins of Winnsboro. Jory says that he always had a heightened visual sense when he was writing and thought of that process as painting with words. "I picture things clearly in my mind," he says. "And that image flows on the creative

energy to the canvas."

Sherman, who lives in Pittsburg with his wife, Charlotte, has been a full-time writer for over fifty years and has won the Spur Award for his westerns. He has also been nominated for a Pulitzer Prize.

He began his writing career as a poet in San Francisco and has been widely published in journals and anthologies. He has pub-

lished over 300 books, thousands of articles and 500 short stories, and he continues to write and mentor other writers.

His writing classes have been held at the Winnsboro Center for the Arts, Northeast Texas Community College, and numerous writer's conferences.

The majority of his books are westerns, but he has also written literary and mainstream novels. His publishers include Doubleday, Zebra, Avon, Berkley, Walker & Co., Tor, Forge, Bantam, Major Books, Pinnacle, The First Ozark Press, White Oak Press, and others.

Many readers and writers have praised his books and this is what Richard S. Wheeler said about "The Baron Honor" - "Jory Sherman writes incomparably of early Texas, where the land is bloody ground and so are the hearts of his characters.

He knows the soul and spirit and stubborn passion of those who forged the Lone Star State. He knows its feuds, its honor, its dreams, its triumphs, its bullheaded genius. He may well be the finest writer of historical novels in our times."
